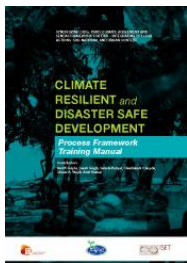

Disasters (natural / environmental, technological or socio-civil) since long have been considered tragic interruptions to the development process. When a disaster strikes, development funds are diverted to meet emergency and relief and reconstruction needs to get the country “back on track” toward economic and social development.

Disaster losses include not only the shocking direct impacts that we see in the news, such as the loss of life, housing, and infrastructure, but also indirect impacts such as the foregone production of goods and services caused by interruptions in utility services, transport, labor supplies, suppliers, or markets. Damage and losses to ecosystems / natural resources and livelihoods, health, infrastructure and businesses, social and economic systems, are the critical concerns of the time in the journey towards Sustainable development goals 2015-30. Interestingly, these are equally the concerns of Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction and Paris Climate Agreement for the same period.

In recent years, the linkages between environment, disasters and development are being re-emphasized due to significance in public governance and sustainability. This evolution seems inevitable considering disproportionately high costs that developing countries pay for disasters. Recent major disasters like Leh floods, Uttarakhand flood, Maingao



landslide, Cyclones Aila, Laila, Phailin, Hudhud, Okhi, Nepal earthquake, and number of chemical/ industrial, technological, incidences, call for understanding these relationships. Behavioural, environmental and socio-economic aspects in safety and disaster risk management are now considered critical. Occurrences of urban flood have become annual feature. Environmental changes viz. climate change, land-use and natural resource degradation, are known to aggravate hazards and vulnerability attributes. As well captured from the transition from HFA (2005-15) – it's priority 4 to priority 1 of SFDRR, i.e. Addressing underlying causes of risk and vulnerability to “Understanding Disaster Risk” makes “HRVA” and disaster management strategy/plan fundamental to safeguards sectors and businesses, services, assets and infrastructure under various Ministries/departments of the Government and associated establishments.



India's Prime Ministers Shri Narendra Modi, with his experience of dealing with disaster risk and issues of sustainable development, to address the multiple challenges in an integrated manner, gave a 10 point agenda while inaugurating the 7th Asian Ministerial Conference on 3rd November 2016 at New Delhi.
